Since this project is extremely detailed, time-consuming, and large, I will be combining my original work and final product into one big project that I will present at the end of the year when the trip is complete. While I do not have a singular, complete document to submit for my original work, I have a conglomeration of tasks that I have had to complete so far in regards to this medical mission trip. Some of these tasks include, filling out documentation, applying for grants, setting up and launching social media accounts, creating a T-shirt design, coordinating meetings and dinners, among other things.
